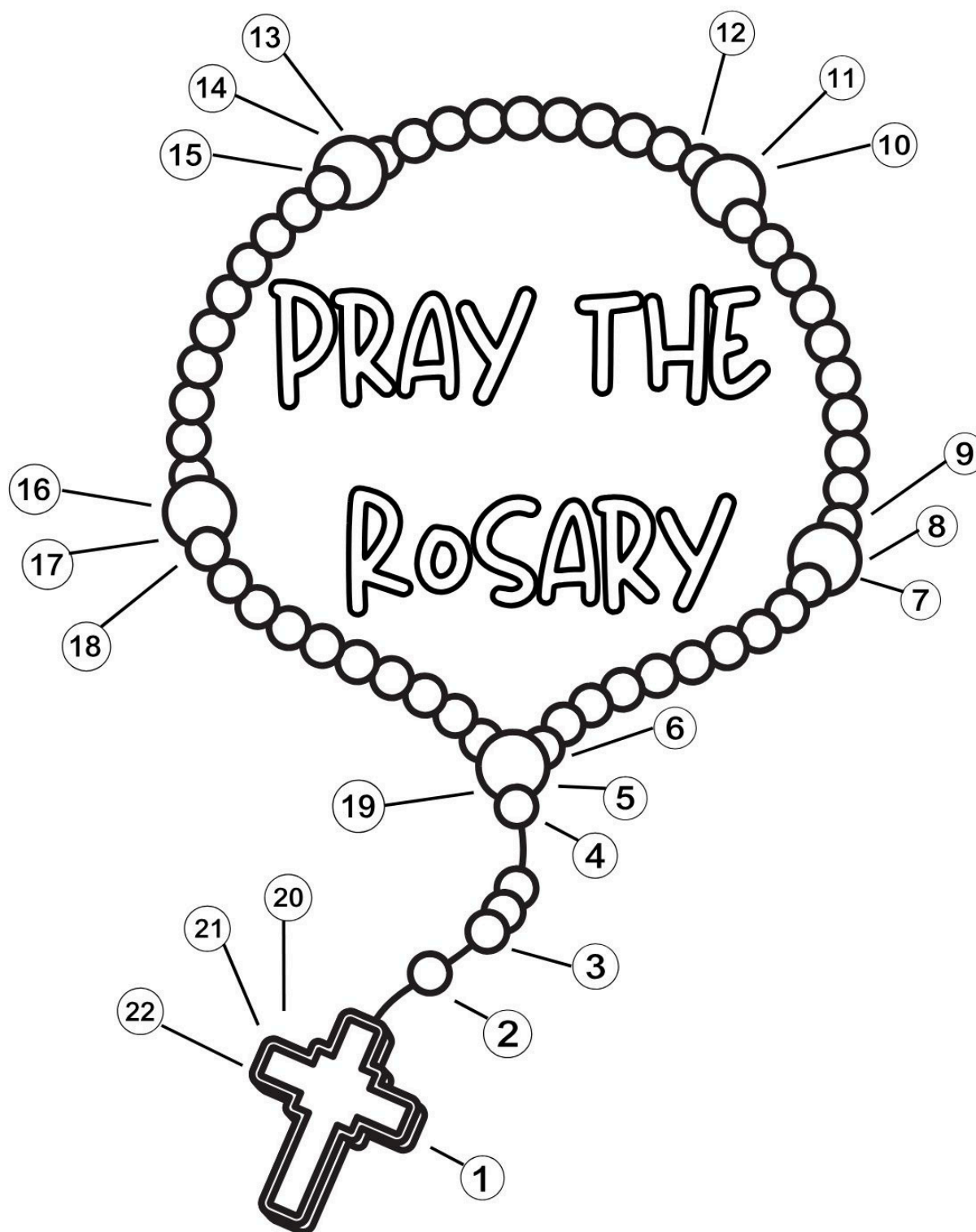

Why pray something so repetitive?

One of my greatest struggles with the Rosary was the repetition of prayers. 50 Hail Marys often put me in 'auto-pilot' and left me feeling like I was simply rattling off words. Why bother with it when I could say a heartfelt personal prayer instead?

Ultimately, the Rosary was revealed to us as a gift. It is intended to help us 'fill our minds with the mysteries of the life of Christ' and has often been described as a 'weapon' for our spiritual life. Sadly, as much as I would have liked otherwise, this information did not help me engage prayerfully (read: stay awake), especially after a long day!

I started reflecting on the importance and beauty of repetition in my every day life:

Repetition as discipline:

When I go to the gym, I don't see results until I commit to regular training. As much as I would love to get fit and build muscle from a monthly session, I know that it is through repetitive training ('showing up every day') that I will reach my goals. Repetition develops the discipline I need to do things that are good for me.

Repetition as love:

I have lost count of the times I have cooked dinner for my family, or bathed my children. I'm not always super excited to do these things, and they can feel a bit mundane (do I need to make lunches every day?). But I repeat these things as an expression of my love. More often than not, these things help deepen my love because I am putting the needs of others before my own desires ("true love is willing the good of the other").

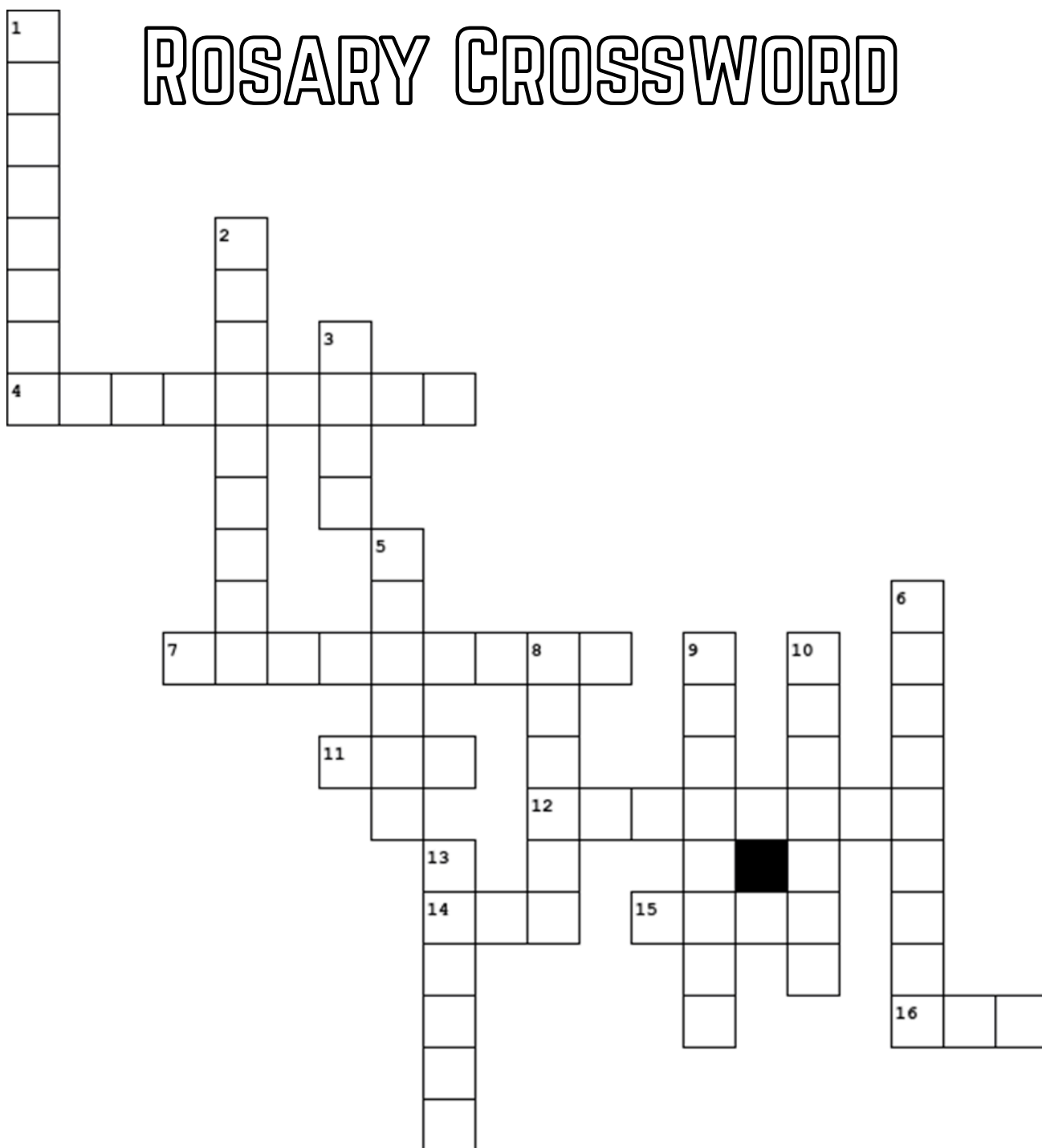
I came to the conclusion that repetition is not a bad thing, and often is a powerful way of developing good habits and health, as well as expressing love.

I pondered these things in context of the Holy Rosary. The repetition of prayers could be an instrument to:

- Develop the discipline of extended prayer (to support my spiritual wellness)
- Express and deepen my love of Christ (through the mundane).

There's so much more to the Rosary than its repetition. But the repetition can, in and of itself, help us grow closer to Jesus.... something worth the time and effort.

Where is the Hail Mary in the Bible?

If we're going to be praying the rosary regularly, we are going to be praying A LOT of Hail Marys. The rosary is repetitive, like so many other important things we do (eating, sleeping, and saying "I love you" to our family members), but that doesn't mean that it is mindless. In fact, to pray the Hail Mary is to declare Biblical truth.

Let's break it down:

The first half of the prayer is straight out of Sacred Scripture. When the angel Gabriel appeared to Mary to announce that she would be the mother of Jesus, he greeted her, **"Hail, full of grace, the Lord is with thee: blessed art thou among women"** (Luke 1:28). God chose Mary to be the mother of our saviour. She certainly was blessed.

While Mary was pregnant with Jesus, she went to visit her cousin, Elizabeth. At Mary's greeting, the child in Elizabeth's womb leapt, and filled with the holy spirit, Elizabeth declared, **"Blessed art thou among women, and blessed is the fruit of thy womb"** (Luke 1:41-42). Sound familiar?

The second half of the Hail Mary is not a direct quote from the Bible but it is completely in line with Biblical teaching. We pray: **"Holy Mary, Mother of God, pray for us sinners, now and at the hour of our death. Amen."**

Let's take a closer look:

1. We call Mary "Holy." Does it give Mary honour that only God deserves? No. While only God is holy by nature, others may be called holy by association with him. In the Bible, to be "holy" is to be set apart for God's purpose. People, places, and things are called "holy" throughout Scripture. God declares through Moses that Israel will be a "holy nation" (Ex 19:6). The city of Jerusalem (Is 48:2) and the tabernacle where God's presence dwells (Ex 28:43) are also called "holy." The word "saint" actually means "holy one" (Rom 1:7, Eph 1:1, Phil 1:1, Col 1:2). Undoubtedly, Mary is holy.
2. We call Mary "Mother of God." Jesus is God. Mary is so special because she is his mother. Elizabeth understood this when she exclaimed: **"And how does this happen to me, that the mother of my Lord should come to me"** (Luke 1:43)?
3. We ask Mary to pray for us. Jesus wants his people to pray for one another (check out our other blog posts for more on this). Scripture tells us that the prayers of a righteous and faithful person have great power (James 5:16, Matt 17:20, Matt 21:22, Mark 11:22-24). Who could be more righteous or powerful than Jesus' own beloved mum? Moreover, as our spiritual mother, Mary's role is to help us on our journey to heaven. She loves her children on Earth and is happy to pray for us!

We've seen that the Hail Mary is biblical through and through. But there is much more to what the Bible tells us about Mary! The Visitation: Mary travels to help her cousin, Elizabeth.

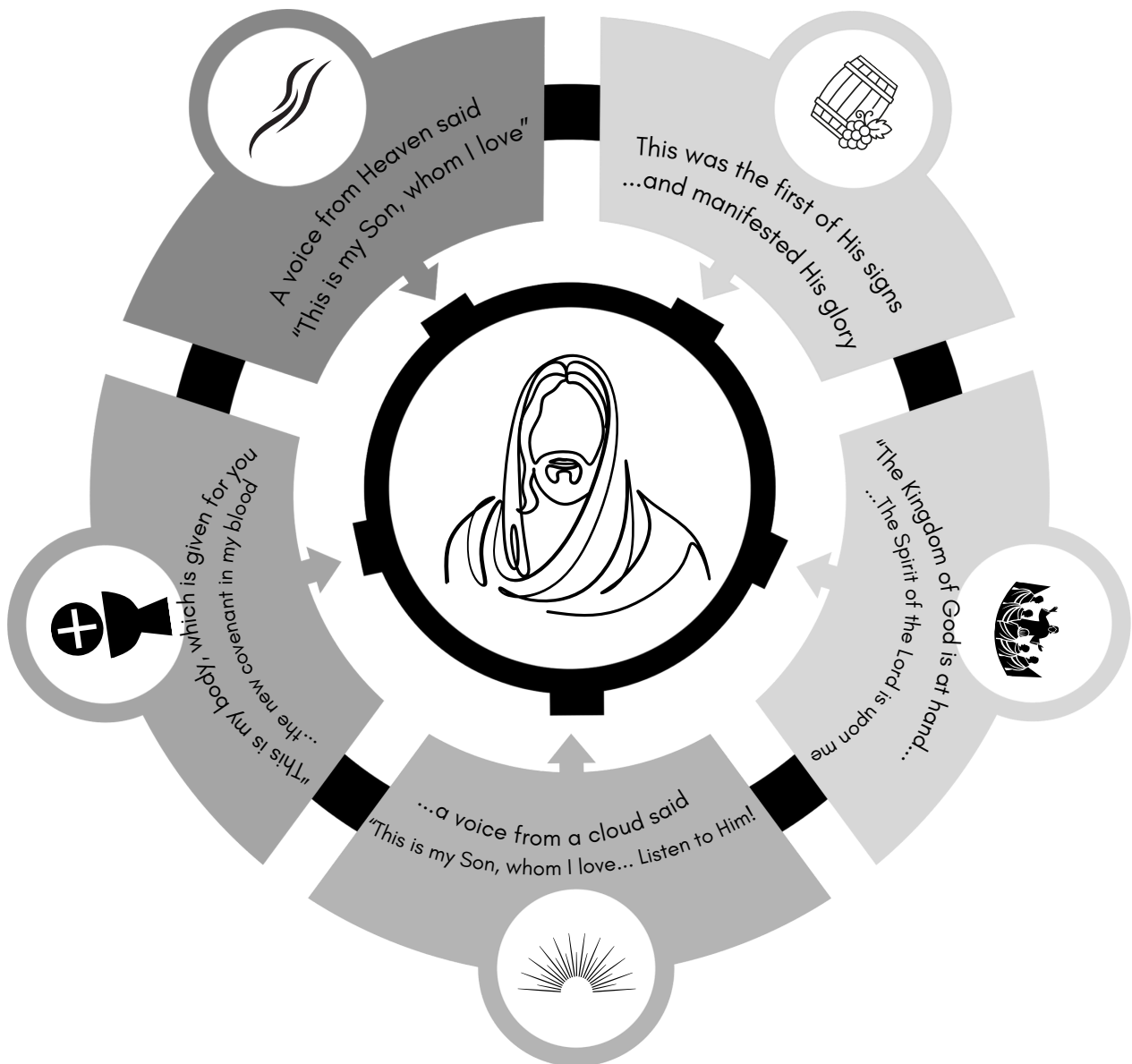
The Nativity: Jesus is born in a stable in Bethlehem.

The Luminous Mysteries 'shine a light' on Jesus' true identity

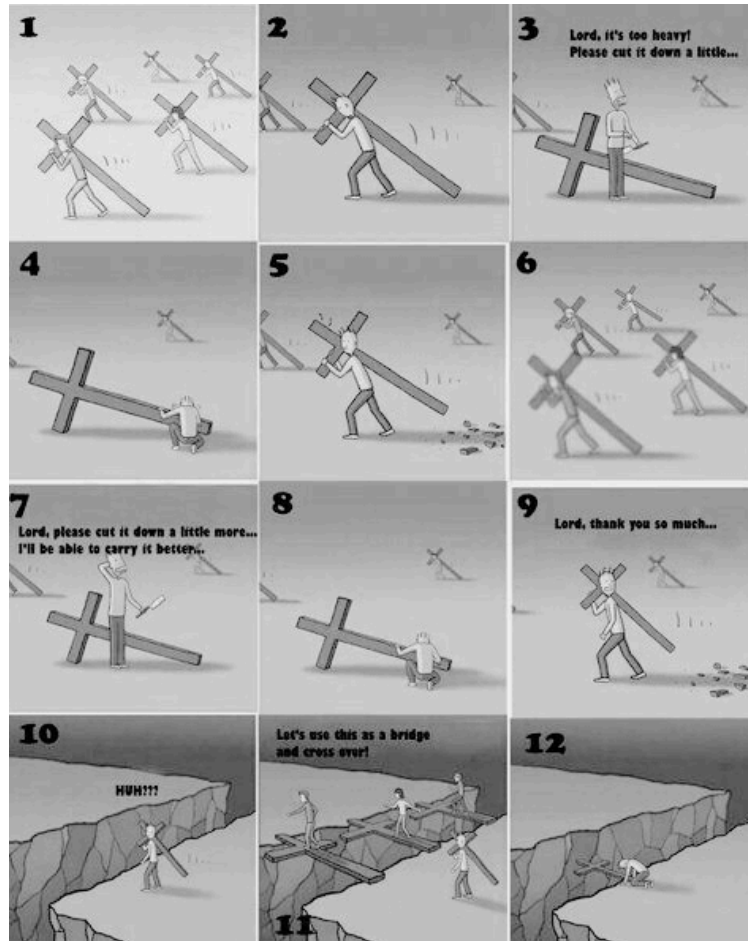

THE SORROWFUL MYSTERIES

The Sorrowful Mysteries highlight the love that Jesus has for each one of us: though He was innocent, He gave His life to open the gates of Heaven to us. These Mysteries also remind us that the difficulties we face in life (our “crosses”) can be used to become more Christ-like; they can help us to grow in virtues (goodness, discipline, faithfulness etc.) and also bring God’s love to the world.

Sometimes we do need our crosses to be taken off us. Take a moment to pray and ask Jesus to either help you carry or to remove the cross from your life.

THE GLORIOUS MYSTERIES

In the fourth and fifth Glorious Mysteries, God demonstrates His power by honoring Mother Mary through the Assumption and Coronation. Some people make the **mistake** of thinking this means Catholics worship Mary. Read the blog post below for an explanation and highlight information that is new to you:

Does the Rosary worship Mary?

Updated: Jan 3, 2022

In short: no. In fact, Catholics never *worship* Mary because worship belongs to God alone. Mary is, however, honored as the Mother of God. She is also held up as a beautiful example of a disciple and turned to as a powerful intercessor (more on that later).

It's easy to think, with 50 Hail Mary prayers, that the Rosary is not really about Jesus. But the Rosary is much more than the prayers recited (even though those are important)... the 'meat' is in the Mysteries that are contemplated during each decade. These reflect on important moments surrounding the life, death and resurrection of Jesus. In fact, if you pray a 'scriptural Rosary' there is a Gospel passage for each bead! Therefore, the Rosary is a powerful tool to contemplate Jesus' message, His sacrifice and, ultimately, His love for each of us.

Having said that, Mary is mentioned a whoooooole lot each time the Rosary is prayed. Sometimes this leads to the misconception that she is glorified, even worshiped (and it doesn't help when some people go way over board with Marian statues!). But Mary is turned to and mentioned in the prayers for some important reasons:

- Without Mary, no Jesus!

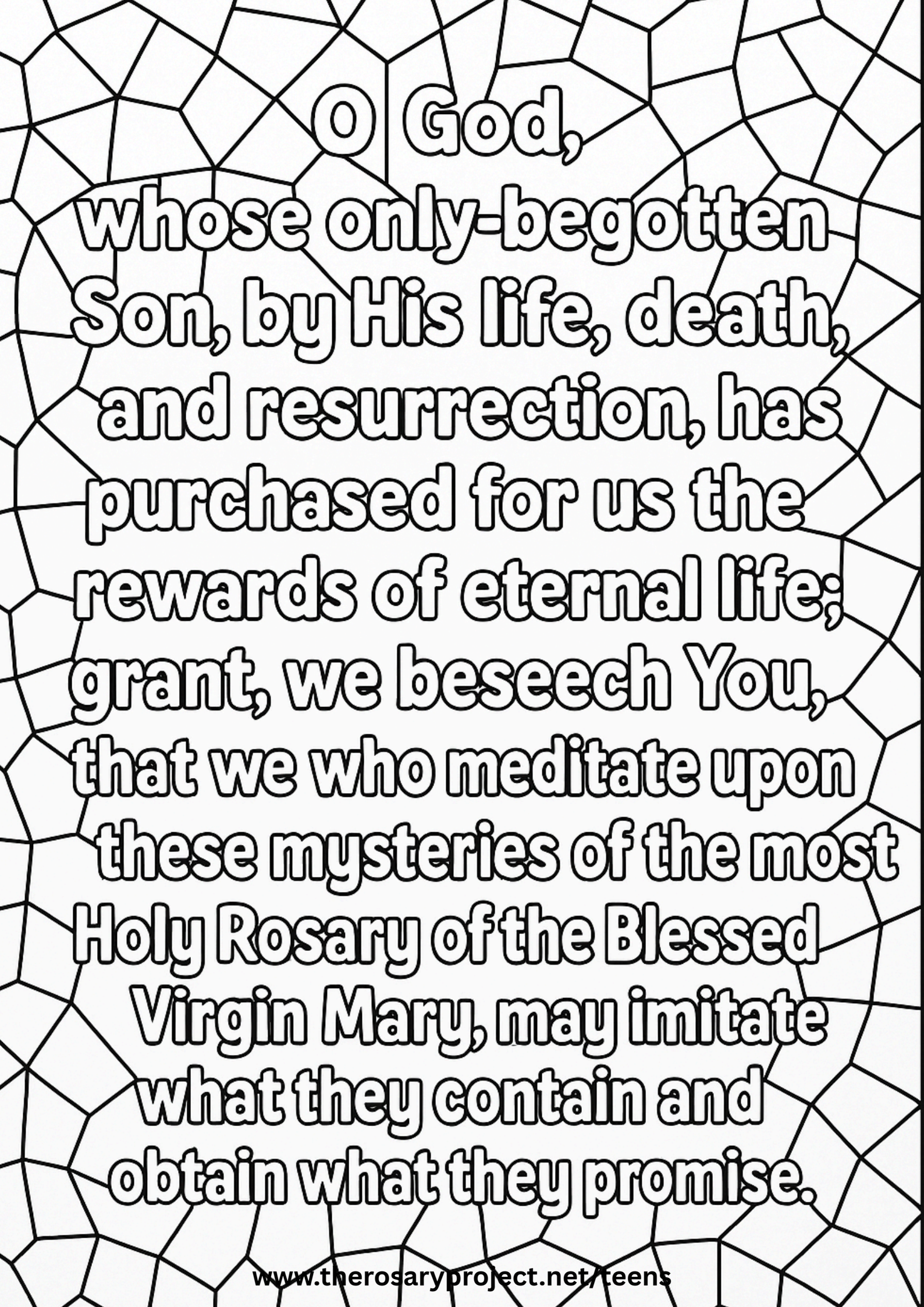
Mary had the free will to say no to God's plan for the salvation of humanity. She absolutely could have rejected the Angel Gabriel's proposal and gone on to live a normal life. But she said yes. And the rest is (salvation) history.

- Mary points to Jesus.

In Scripture, Mary is always pointing us to her son. This is through her words ("Do whatever He tells you") and her actions ("near the cross stood His mother...") Mary is never the protagonist in Scripture, but she is a key character who teaches us how to follow and love Christ.

- Mary is an intercessor

Mary never 'answers' prayers, but she is considered a powerful intercessor. This means that she can pray for those on earth, and her prayers receive special attention from God. Of course, we can direct our prayers straight to Jesus and they will be heard. But consider the special relationship between any mother and her child... it isn't a long stretch to think that if Mary takes something up with Jesus, that He would listen (just like at the Wedding of Cana).

ROSARY MIRACLES

There have been many accounts testifying to the power of the Rosary. Here is are two famous one from recent history:

MIRACULOUS PROTECTION FROM ATOMIC BOMB

During World War II, an atomic bomb was dropped on the town of Hiroshima, Japan. Everything within a mile was annihilated. The only survivors were eight priests who walked away from the atomic blast and lived into old age. They lived with no radiation sickness, no loss of hearing, or any other visible long term defects or maladies. Naturally, the priests were interviewed and examined numerous times by scientists and health care people about their remarkable experience (Fr. Schiffer, a survivor, said it was over 200 times). Throughout all interviews, the priests repeated "we believe that we survived because we were living the message of Fatima. We lived and prayed the rosary daily in that home."

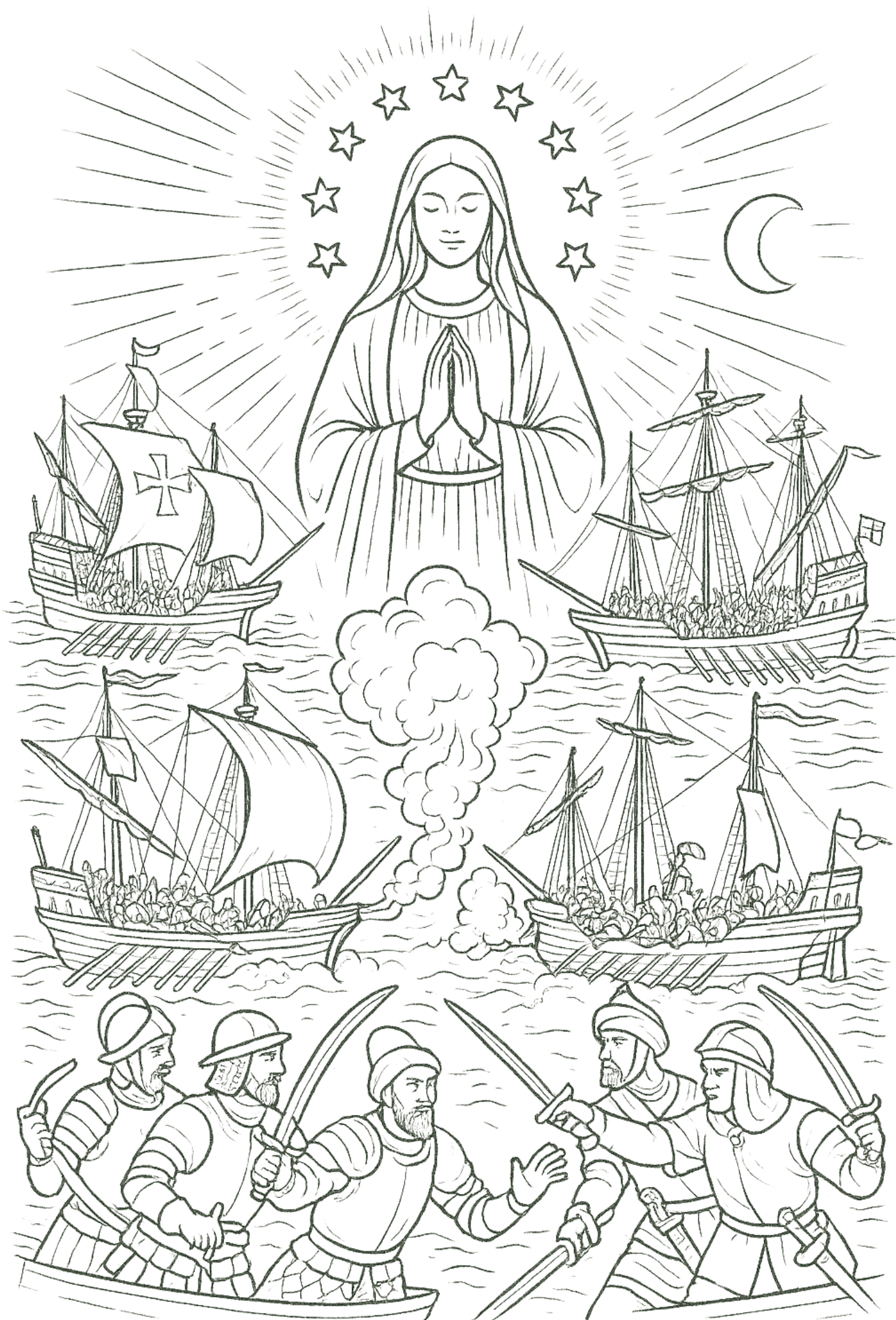


GUNS FELL TO ROSARIES

The citizens of the Philippines were poor and starving. They wanted to elect a new president, Benigno Aquino, but he was assassinated in front of his wife and family. After this brutal murder, his wife, Corazon "Cory" Aquino, became active in protests against the government regime and she ran for President. A snap election was called on February 7, 1986 and this turned out to be a bloody, violent, and fraud-filled event. President Marcos was declared the winner by his corrupt government, took control of the media, and sent out the military to quell any protests. Cardinal Sin of the Archdiocese of Manila urged a peaceful protest and the Catholic people came out in droves. They surrounded the military tanks and armed soldiers, prayed the rosary, and sang religious and protest songs. Holy Masses and prayer vigils took place in churches. This prayerful protest continued for almost a week when, unexpectedly, the soldiers stepped away from their tanks, put down their guns, and joined the peaceful crowd. President Marcos fled the country and the whole nation took to the streets in celebration. Prayers of thanksgiving and holy masses were held in gratitude to God.

Reflect: *What are some miracles the world (or you!) need right now?*

The image on the following page depicts the **Battle of Lepanto** (fought on October 7, 1571). The Catholic understanding is that this was a significant military and spiritual victory attributed to the intercession of the Blessed Virgin Mary and the power of the Holy Rosary. The Christian fleet, though outnumbered, achieved a decisive victory. The triumph highlighted the power of collective prayer, unity among Christians, and Mary's maternal protection.



Why not pray straight to Jesus?

If Jesus is God, and it is only God who can answer my prayers, why should I bother asking Mary or one of the Saints to intercede for me? Shouldn't I just pray straight to the 'Big Boss'?

Two points worth considering:

1. Church members pray for each other

There are many passages in the Bible which instruct us to pray for one another (two examples include James 5:16 and 1Thessalonians 5:25). Moreover, Jesus commonly helped one person because of another person's faith (for example, when Jesus heals the centurion's servant in Matt 8:13 or Jairus' daughter in Luke 8:49-55). In my own life, this means I often ask others to pray for my intentions, and I, in turn, offer to pray for theirs. This is not because "more prayers = answered prayers". We pray for one another because of what we read in Scripture and with faith that we will be heard by God. The Church community, however, is not limited to that on earth... the 'Church Triumphant' is the communion of Saints who are in Heaven with God. We, as the Church on earth, are still united to these members in a special way. Which is why, just as instructed in the Bible, they continue to pray (intercede) for us.

2. Mary's prayers receive special attention

This is not to diminish the power of our own prayers and those of our community. But Mary literally carried Jesus in her womb. She is preeeeetty special. It also isn't a long stretch to think that there is a unique relationship between Mary and Jesus that continued beyond Jesus' time on earth.... she was his mum after all. We need only reflect on the wedding at Cana to see that Mary could in fact influence her son... Jesus is quoted as saying "It is not yet my time" but still did what Mary asked of him (hello ministry life!). So we can ask Mary to take our prayers to Jesus as our 'preeminent intercessor'.

So yes, of course, we can... and should... pray straight to Jesus. But we also have a whole team upstairs who can help storm Heaven with our intentions, and a very special lady who is extending her hand to lead us to her Son.

Reflect: *Do you have any special intentions you could ask Mary to intercede for?*

The image on the following page depicts the **Immaculate Heart of Mary**. Devotion to this is rooted in Sacred Scripture (e.g. "...Mary treasured all these words and pondered them in her heart." Lk 2:19). It focuses on Mary's purity and love for God, her maternal love for Jesus Christ, and her love and compassion for all mankind.

Symbolism:

- Mary's heart is visible outside of her body. This points to her undying love for all people. Her love is such that she can not contain it within.
- The heart is typically on fire, which emphasizes the intensity of her love for God and for humanity.
- White roses that encircle her heart. These symbolize her purity, brought about by her Immaculate Conception, creating within her a most pure heart.
- A single sword pierces her heart, referring to the passage of Luke ("a sword shall pierce...") and bringing to mind the sorrows she endured during her lifetime.
- The heart is typically surrounded by rays of light. This brings to mind Revelation 12:1, where it describes the Blessed Virgin Mary as "a woman clothed with the sun."

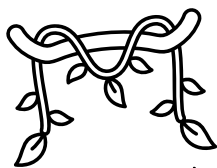

The image on the following page depicts a scene from **Revelation 12**. In Catholic teaching, it is understood as a multi-layered prophecy with several interconnected meanings. Primarily, the "woman clothed with the sun" is interpreted as both the Blessed Virgin Mary and the Church.
